Vice President's Report

The Vice President's role, as far as I know, is not documented in detail, but includes standing in for the President where necessary and being an active member of the committee. During the year I have acted for the President on two occasions, firstly at the infamously wet first Mt Joy trial and then at the Twin Shock Challenge at Melrose. The general committee has met regularly online. The ability to meet without needing to travel has made it possible to discuss club matters more frequently. In addition, the executive committee (comprising the President, the Vice President, the Treasurer, the Secretary and the IT Manager have communicated regularly during the year as required. Congratulations to Samuel Lockhart for his superb organisation of the online meetings.

The past year has brought new challenges to our club, with inclement weather causing the cancellation of the Oatlands trial and the abandonment of several informal practice days. Fortunately, it was possible to run a second event at Mt Joy in place of Oatlands. The response to the challenge of setting a trial at short notice was superb, with an excellent set of sections being set by members from around the state. With climate change becoming increasingly evident, we can expect more such challenges in the future, but the Mt Joy experience demonstrated that the club can adapt and respond rapidly.

It is apparent that interest in classic bike trials has become a worldwide phenomenon. Our club has seen fit to support and expand classic bike competitions. The response to the inaugural Twin Shock Challenge two years ago was very strong and this has continued into 2022. In order to expand this activity, the committee has agreed that an additional event will be held at Jericho in February 2023 on the Saturday prior to the first Club Championship round.

In relation to classic trials, the massive amount of work undertaken by Nobby Gabbedy in establishing this type of event must be acknowledged. It is worth noting that the Scottish Type event that the club runs each year is another opportunity to bring the classic bikes out, as that event is not part of the club championship and offers a long ride with easily ridden sections.

Finally, and most importantly, thanks to all members and friends of the club who contributed to the efficient running of club events throughout 2022.

Newsletterman stuff

End of year wrap up! Depending on the AGM, this might be the last one I do for a while, someone else might take it over.

EDIT – Yeah nah it's still me.

Over the year, including the Tasmanian Titles and out Twin Shock event, we had 404 online entries (which, if you're geeky, is hilarious, because 404 is an error code for a file or web page which can't be found) and 30 entries on the day, so an average of 36.17 entries per event, meaning 93% of all entries were done online. 87 individual riders showed up over the course of the year, that number obviously bumped up by

the mainland invasion in March. Of those 87, only three riders rode every single event. My proudest moment was Melton Mowbray, zero entries on the day, every entry was done online. Overall, decent, and for those that consistently do this without being reminded, thank you.

We generate a bit of data too. Newsletters, spreadsheets, PDFs, snips of results for Facebook, all that adds up to about 200mb. Not much, but then you add in the 12000 or so photos that Ashlee took this year and It increases a heap. Website backups are a couple of gigabytes each, every month. And, added bonus, those backups work! I know this because I updated a few addons a week or so ago and one of them stuffed the site and had to do a restore. I deliberately didn't add up the time spent generating all that stuff, it'd be hundreds of hours, as would Mick's treasurer work.

The website is going to look different in a couple of weeks when I get some time, and there's some changes to the entry form for next year. It's even easier, but also, for insurance purposes, non-competitive minders need to be entered and signed on. Basically, there's a field to select if you're using a non-competitive minder, the default is no. Select yes, type their name in the box which appears and you're done.

That's about it really, not a huge amount more to say. Merry Christmas and happy new year, enjoy the time off, see you next year!

Twin Shock Challenge

Well, the fantastic weekend of camping that some had planned didn't eventuate. Thunder and lightning on Saturday night wouldn't have been ideal. More on that later.

The lush green fields of Melrose. A couple of weeks back it was a bit doubtful if we'd be able to go there, considering how much rain was around the north west. Thankfully it held off (mostly) so the older bikes could come out and play.

Before I continue, thanks to the Nobby HRC Factory Team for lending myself and a bunch of other riders some four stroke machinery. The TLR200 took a lap or so to get used to, but once I worked out to use the engine to accelerate as well as brake, don't bother with the actual brakes and to just ride it like a tractor, I had a heap of fun and thoroughly enjoyed it.

As to be expected, what with them rarely being ridden and all, some riders had mechanical issues, though in the case of Jeff Wynne, his 'bike problem' was fixed once the fuel tap was turned on. Daniel Fenton's bike had a stuffed front wheel bearing and Ken's Bultaco had some issues. Next one is in February, they'll be fixed by then!

The weather turned it on too, until later in the day when the rain hit while we announced the results.

Sections were set on the 'lessening the risk of damage' side of things, relying more on technical riding and tighter turns rather than obstacles. I can assure you, on a borrowed bike which you've ridden for five minutes, a simple small log or two which you wouldn't think about on your modern bike, suddenly looks like a 6ft monster.

Section one was a nice introduction, on the side of the hill, nice tight downhill turn to come back up, then a tight left hander to ride down off camber, turn at the bottom, almost straight line it back up. Section two had you enter, a tight right then left around a tree, over a small log, around a tree, back down to the left and over a larger log with not a lot of room to the tape on the other side. Section 3 was one of the trickier ones, enter, turn hard right, descend a little and go over a small log, but then immediately turn left across some sticks to test your front end confidence, then weave around a couple of trees down to an off camber asset. It was a bit of a ride back down the paddock, over the creek and back up to section four. This was fairly simple until the last bit where you'd drop down and turn tight left while climbing back up a little, then hard right to exit, there were a few different lines here to choose from. Head back to the cutting, the section

there looked simple but the bark, twigs and a couple of hidden rocks made your line choice very important. Section six was all about turns, riding up the hill, turn hard right to go down a bit, then left again very tight, it was very easy to drop a front wheel outside the tape here, then a simple up and out. Seven looked more like a scrub bash for the first lap or two until a groove wore in, the turn at the top over the log got a bit simpler as it broke away. Then section 8. Ok, well, which line, the tricky one where you're launching across the creek and going up the steep bank giving you a better approach for the exit or do a couple of tight turns then hoping you're spot on so your bars fit between the trees which makes it tighter to go back through the creek which is getting more cut up and slippery as more bikes go through?

Sausages and snags at the end, excellent stubby holders, two out of three trophies to give out because the President was busy, really good day! There's a HEAP of these bikes still in sheds so if you know of one, encourage the owner to get them out and use them. A TL125 showed up on Facebook Marketplace down in Dover the other day, and a TY250 appeared up in Devonport too so they do pop up occasionally for sale.

Kurt won A grade unopposed, Daniel rode three different bikes and still won C grade ahead of Jack on the very good looking Montesa and Dean Medwin rolled out for the first time in a year and finished third. Scott Pickering picked up the Clubman trophy.

Melrose

We started off with a nice section through the gate for the cars and vans, that was a bit of a slippery bugger because of the rain the night before. And the week before. And the month before. One day, we might get some sun and dry out a bit.

I think a few of us were worried about potential bike drownings, changes to sections avoided that, except for right at the end of the day, Daniel managing to get water into Rosie's bike which now requires some surgery.

Sections were spread out all to the right of the main creek, a couple were varied versions of the previous day's event. They were laid out logically, it made sense riding them that way but remembering it after the fact is a challenge. Section one was an almost reverse of Saturday's section eight, if I'd had time I would have ridden it the twin shock direction on the modern bike. Nothing too major but it wasn't a straight line through the rutted out entry and exit from the creek which made it tricky. Section two in the cutting had about a million different lines for C grade, a proper choose your own adventure, a tricky turn for Clubman on the bark and rocks and rubbish, and those tyres for B grade and up. Bash plates stop real quick on rubber, there's more grip there than there is on logs and rocks. Steep banks are good fun though. Section three had no steep banks and was a great example of little things taking points, tight turns over old wheel ruts took a few. It was also pretty spectacular watching the upper grades flying through the air, Ashlee got a few nice shots there. Ride up the road a bit more and there's section four. Again, nothing too dramatic, more steep banks, until the ground started to turn to slush towards the end of the section, it was hard to even get a decent track cut in due to the slop. Back down to the manmade section five, and probably one of the harder C+ lines, having to turn down an incline and onto a log, tricky stuff needing a lot of confidence. Again, some more impressive stuff from the upper grades on the pile of logs at the start and a cool looking stack of logs at the exit. From here, go back up beside section one to section six. It was almost a section getting to it through the mud and the creek. The upper grades had some cool steep banks, stopping and turning then taking off again, lower grades had chewed out banks in the creek and a tight finish, easy to cross the tape there. Finally, section seven and probably one of the hardest ones after lunch. A tight twisty section, with an angled downhill log, the Clubman riders weaved amongst the trees, but the main taking point was THAT exit. Uphill, off camber with a couple of exposed, scuffed up, wet tree roots. Some struggled, a few didn't, it took some points off, a proper sting in the tail.

It was great to see the return of Tom Woodhouse to Expert, picking up second behind Chris Bayles.

There were some big gaps in the scores but fully charged up Brendan Smith made it look easy in A grade, winning ahead of Jordan Perkins and Dylan Bayles.

B grade was dominated by Jack Salter, he might move off to A grade next year. Kalam Langworthy finished in second, Jenna Lupo in third.

International visitor Peter Hosking came over from New Zealand, rode super smooth and wasn't particularly troubled by the sections, cleaning up C+. Sam Calow rode well to grab second, Ossa Academy Ian Pickering in third place.

C grade was the tight class, as it as been for most of the year. Newsletterman won, one point ahead of David Catt. Andrew Roycroft put in a blinder to finish third, I think that's his best result ever, good stuff!

Twin shock had four riders, two riding as non competitive. Alex Woodbury wasn't troubled at all and won ahead of Santa Claus/Colin.

Clubman was far closer between all three riders at this event than it has been all year, only 12 points between first and third. Scott Pickering won, ahead of Will Delanty and Cooper Lockhart.
